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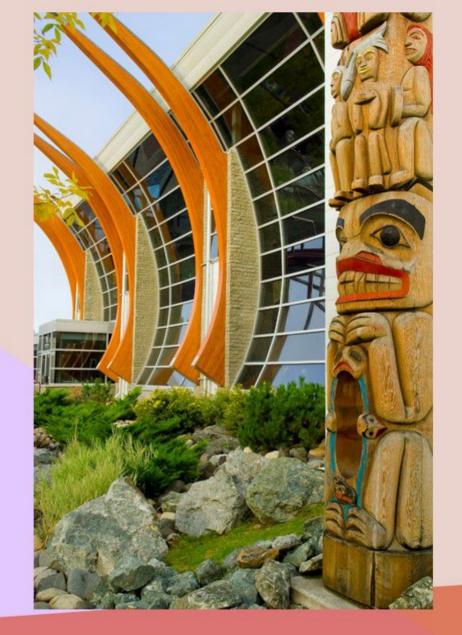

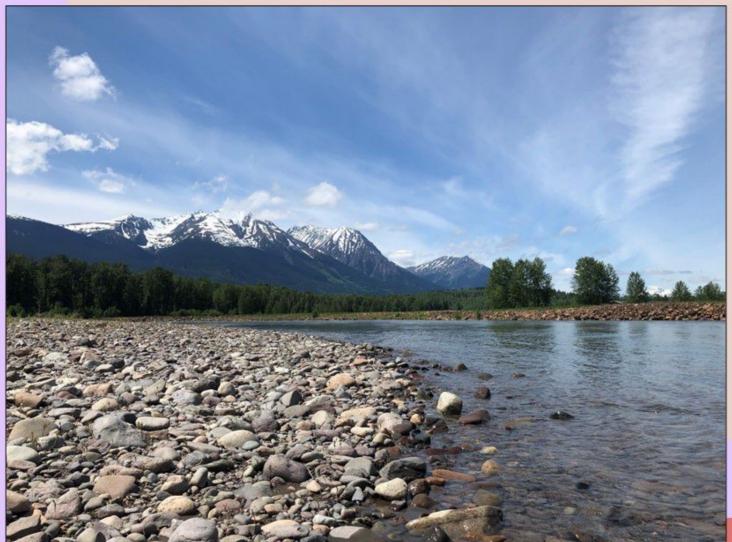
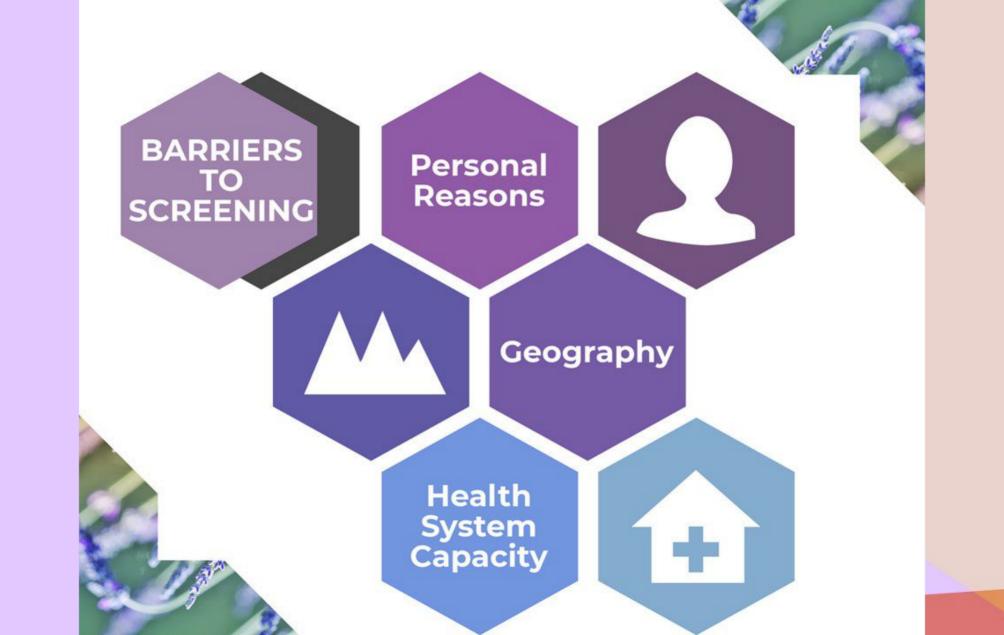


Image: Wet'suwet'en traditional territory; Wedzin kwa River





The HPV vaccine protects for 90% of cervical cancer.

Regular screening can prevent cancer by detecting it at an early stage.



What causes cervical cancer

Cervical cancer is caused by the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV), which is passed through sexual contact (sex, skin to skin contact).

their lives.

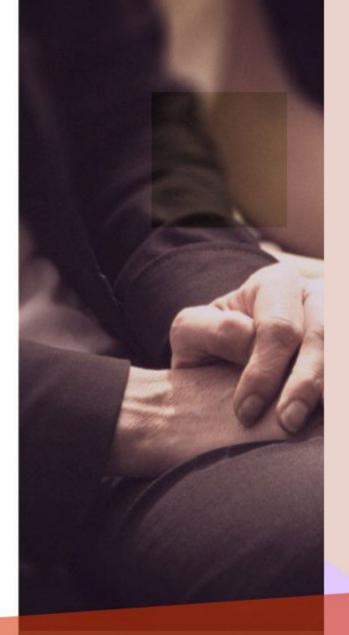

What is cervical screening

Pap Testing

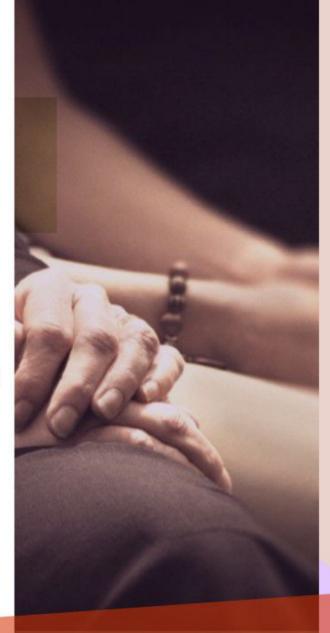
- Clinician (a doctor or trained nurse) performs a pelvic exam, collects cells from your cervix with a small brush
- Sample goes to the lab to be examined for cell abnormalities
- Abnormal results indicate the need for additional follow-up



What is cervical screening

HPV Testing

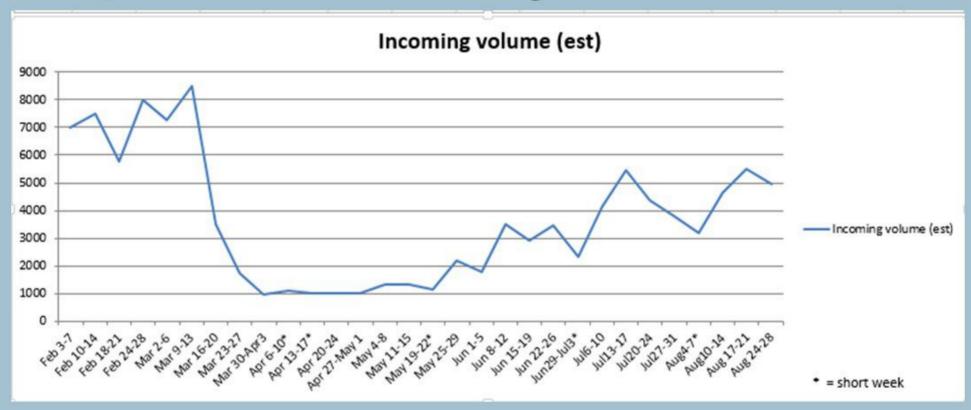
- Can be done by a clinician, or by yourself (i.e., self-screening)
- Uses a small brush to collect cells close to the cervix
- Sample goes to the lab, and is tested for HPV
- If a high-risk type of HPV is detected, then further follow-up will be recommended



Current screening rates in BC

- ☐ In 2018, the average screening rate was 68%.
- Of those individuals who were diagnosed with invasive cervical cancer in 2017, 59% had either not screened in 5 years or had never been screened.
 - □ First Nations women were found to have higher incidence in cervical cancer than non-First Nations women
 - We have no data yet available on Métis individuals diagnosed with cervical cancer.
 - We need approaches to improve access to cervical cancer screening in Indigenous communities.

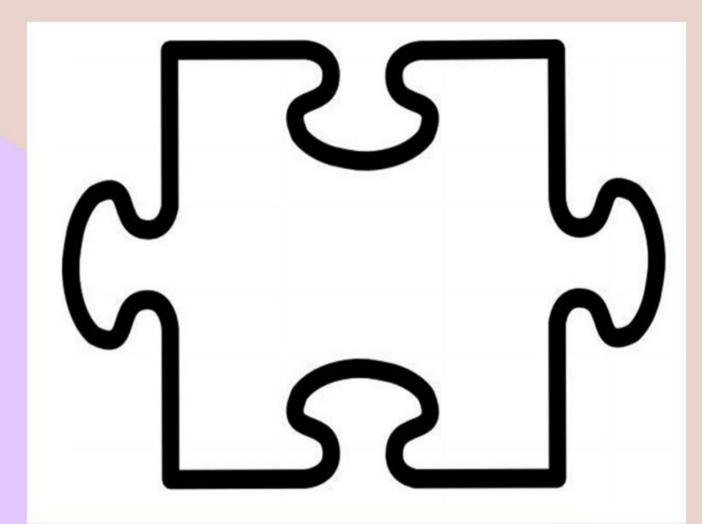
HPV Self-Collection Projects

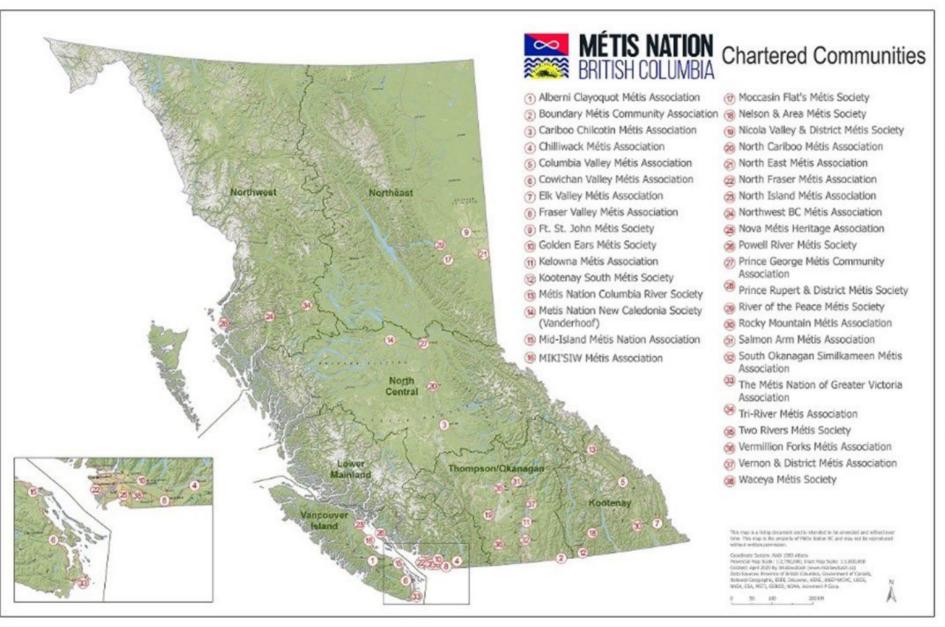

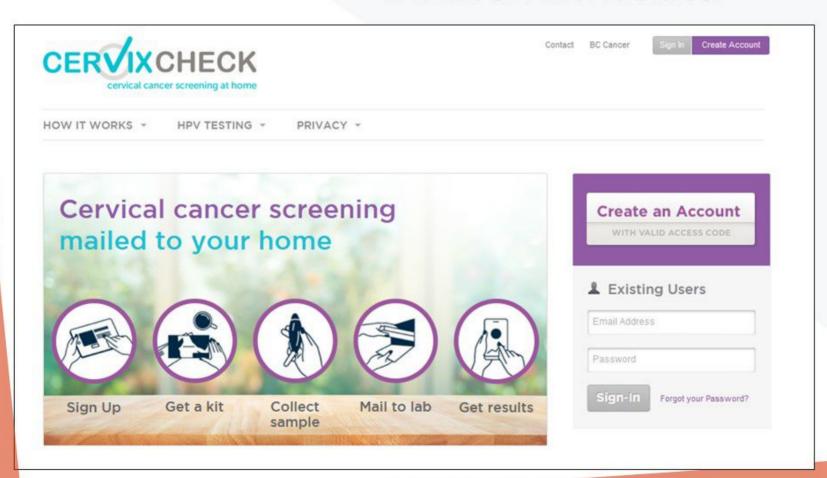
